Jazz Evening


Paula Jackman's Jazzmen gave us another superb entertainment on the evening of 23rd February at the Holly Trees Primary School Hall.

Visit to Germany 2013

Thursday 5th

The flight to Munich for our visit to Roth was a good one. We arrived 20 min earlier than expected and the bus was waiting for us. After boarding nothing seemed to move or happen for a good while and then it was announced that that a failure of the battery was the cause of it. This could take up to two hours to repair.

The weather was nice and sunny and we sat outside on a patio of the airport and were served Frankfurter and Weisswurst Sausages with chunks of bread to soften the two hourly wait.

Our hosts were waiting for us when we finally arrived at Roth with a warm welcome and a hug. Many of the members on either side have known each other for 34 years and were delighted to meet again.

Friday

After exchanging all the news with our friends well into the late hours on Thursday night, we met the following morning at the town Hall (Landratsamt) for the official greeting. Landrat Herbert Eckstein delivered his speech in near enough perfect English: 'I have the pleasure to welcome you in Roth....' he began and then proceeded to express his approval of the new Chairs that had been appointed replacing Ingeborg with Anne Klier and Angela with Roger Winter, therefore assuring the continuation of our Town -Twinning- Association. Our Mayor Madeline Henwood praised the effort that gone into arranging the visit. She then exchanged presents with Herbert Eckstein. In the afternoon an interesting guided tour through the historic part of Nuernberg was conducted and still left ample free time to do any shopping.

Saturday

The Limes Museum we visited on Saturday is of an unusual modern design and devoted to the Romans. The German Limes Road runs from the upper Rhine to Regensburg on the Danube and depicts the Borderline.

There are numerous historically interesting stations with rebuilt watchtowers that are strategically placed in order to watch over the border fortifications. (resembling very much the watchtowers that used to line the East German borders separating the East from the West.) Inside the museum we could see various Roman relics and images of buildings and lifestyle of the people from the past. By the way, the Limes Museum did win a design award in 2010.

Lunch in Gerolfingen at the brewery restaurant 'Gasthof Roetter' was a welcome break, were the Schnitzels went down a treat with beer and wine.

In the afternoon the visit to a health farm called 'Schmalzmuehle' was quite an experience. The farm is a working dairy farm which produces its own cheese and bakes its own bread.

We were invited to produce our own cheese and eat it. Placed at a long table, we were served a plate with various cold meats and cheeses with

Then a container with milk was put in the middle of the table and a young man with a good sense of humour came and injected the milk with rennet so it could set. After 20min a bucket with some disinfectant came along and someone had to put a finger in it ready to test the milk for its consistency.



When it was pronounced set, it had to be crosscut to produce squares. Everybody took part in it. Some of the squares were not really true squares due to the amount of wine that had been consumed.

Then the cheese had to be put on a large sieve so the whey could drain off and leave an edible soft cheese.

The owner entertained us with the history of the farm, laced with witty remarks.

That afternoon was full of fun and everybody had a really good time.

Sunday

The Service at the Protestant Stadtkirche in Roth took place at 10 o'clock and was conducted in German as well as English. It was a very moving service and well attended by the Twin Towning from Brentwood.

After the service there was time and opportunity to have coffee and cake and a chat with the priest who was a very interesting young man. The rest of the day was free to meet with other friends and acquaintances.

Monday

In the morning we were welcomed by the Mayor Georg Kuttinger in the Town Hall of Thalmaessing and we had our lunch at the restaurant 'Zum Loewen'

Our guide was Fritz on a motorised grass cutter, who spoke a very strong Bavarian Dialect and Roger did an excellent translation that was not at all easy.



The Museum showed every aspect of how the Celts used to live, sharing the living quarters with the animals. It was a very enjoyable and interesting afternoon with lots of sunshine.



In the evening we attended the customary "Friendship Evening" at the restaurant "Waldblick."
